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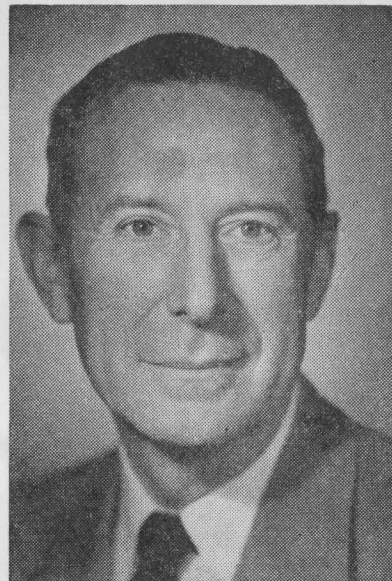

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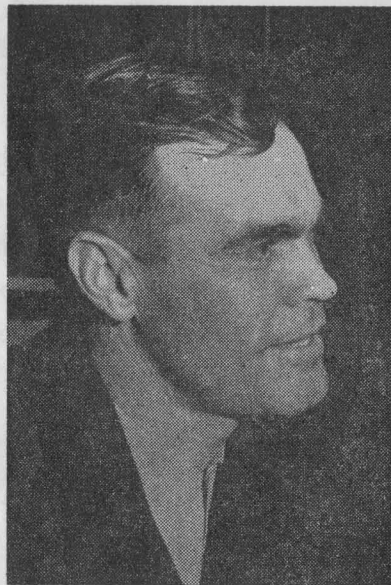

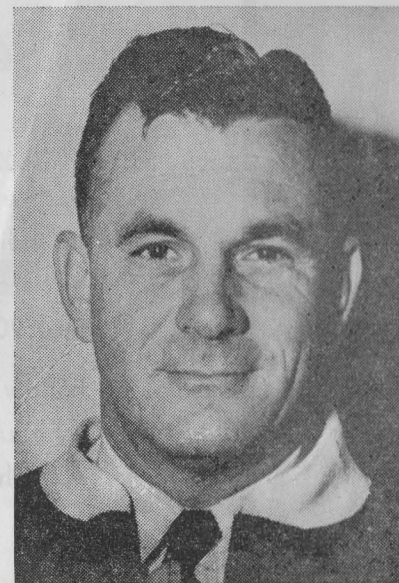

HARRY STITELER, Head Football Coach—Received B.A. degree in history and physical education from Texas A&M in 1931 and master's degree in administrative education from University of Texas in 1939.

Stiteler lettered in track at Texas A&M in 1929, 30 and 31 and in football in 1930 as a 137-pound quarterback.

Coach Stiteler started his coaching career at Smithville High School in 1931 as an assistant coach. He continued in high school coaching at Smithville, Bellville, Corpus Christi and Waco through the 1945 season. His roundup of accomplishments while in high school coaching includes:

Championship teams at Bellville and Smithville. State championship and two other district titles at Corpus Christi. State co-championship and three other district titles at Waco. As head coach, he lost only one district game in last 13 years of high school coaching.

Stiteler was an assistant coach at Rice in 1946 when the Owls tied for the Southwest Conference title. He was an assistant at Texas A&M in 1947. After lean years in 1948 and 1949, Stiteler is looking forward to better things in 1950 when many of the boys who were freshmen his first year at Aggieland will be juniors.

WILLIAM T. (BILL) DUBOSE, Line Coach—Played three years as linesman for University of Texas, in 1930, 1931 and 1932 . . . was freshman line coach at Texas in 1933 . . . in 1935 and 1936 he was head coach at Hondo High School . . . was line coach at Nacogdoches in 1937, then went to Corpus Christi as line coach for Harry Stiteler in 1938 . . . Corpus Christi won state high school title that year, defeating Lubbock in the finals . . . He became head coach at Corpus Christi in 1942 when Stiteler moved to Waco . . . When Stiteler moved to Rice in fall of 1946, Dubose took over at Waco, coached team that went to state quarter-finals . . . next season, his Tigers were second in district . . . when Stiteler became head coach at Texas A&M in 1948, he immediately named Dubose his line coach.

GILBERT STEINKE, Assistant Coach—During the 1950 season, Steinke probably will divide time between the varsity and freshman teams and also will handle some of the scouting duties . . . Steinke is a former little all-American halfback at Texas A&I . . . he played pro football with the Philadelphia Eagles and led the National League in punt returns in 1946 . . . later he was backfield coach at Trinity University in San Antonio . . . in 1949, he was freshman football coach at Oklahoma A&M.

TEXAS AGGIE COACHES

(CONTINUED)

DICK TODD, Backfield Coach—Todd quit pro football after 1948 season. He had enjoyed a long and successful tenure with the Washington Redskins . . . Todd joined the Aggie coaching staff last winter in time to hand out some valuable pointers during spring drills to the Cadets' many young sophomore backs . . . he is remembered as one of the best broken field runners ever to wear the maroon and white of Texas A&M . . . He was here in 1936, 1937 and 1938, finishing one year before the Cadets won the national title . . . although he played on mediocre Aggie teams, Todd was an all-conference back . . . he still holds world's record for most points scored in a single football season, having rolled up 318 points at Crowell High School in 1934.

BILL (DOG) DAWSON, End Coach—Played high school football and other sports at Crockett in East Texas before continuing athletic career at Allen Academy, Lon Morris and Texas A&M . . . lettered in football as an end on Aggie teams that won conference titles in 1939 and 1940 . . . entered army infantry as second lieutenant (platoon leader), rose to major . . . served two years in European theater . . . played football on the Army's all-west team which met five professional teams in 1942 . . . after returning from army was made assistant to the athletic director and football scout at Texas A&M.

BILL DAYTON, Trainer—Dayton was named trainer at Texas A&M on August 1st, 1949, and since that time he has compiled a remarkable record of keeping Aggie athletes "ready to play" . . . Outsiders who have followed his work over the years rate Dayton one of the top trainers in the country . . . before coming to Texas A&M, he served two years as trainer at Tulane . . . he was trainer at the University of Miami from 1938 thru 1942 and again in 1945, 1946 and part of 1947 . . . he served in the Navy and was at Georgia Pre-Flight in Athens, Ga. for three years . . . Dayton graduated from high school in 1933 and was graduated from the Swedish Institute of Physiotherapy in 1937 . . . he was graduated from the Eastern School of Physio-therapy in 1938.

PERRON SHOEMAKER, Freshman Coach—An all-southern high school end at Beaufort, Texas . . . later starred at University of Alabama in all sports . . . made one of Grantland Rice's all-America teams while there . . . Shoemaker was on Alabama team that played California in 1938 Rose Bowl game . . . in 1937, he was voted the "Best All-Around Athlete" at Alabama . . . rejected pro football offers after graduation and entered coaching field . . . coached at University of Chattanooga, Idaho University and Florida U. before coming to A&M . . . had excellent war record as foot soldier with 36th Division.

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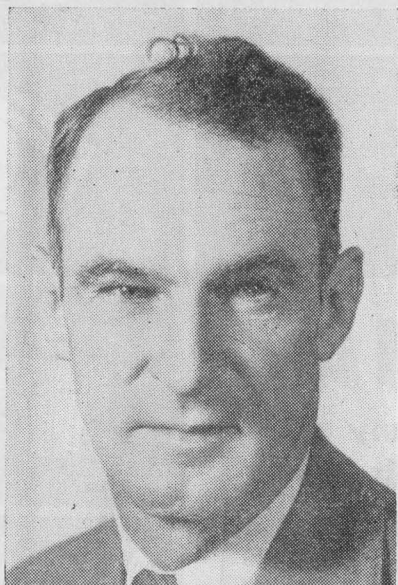
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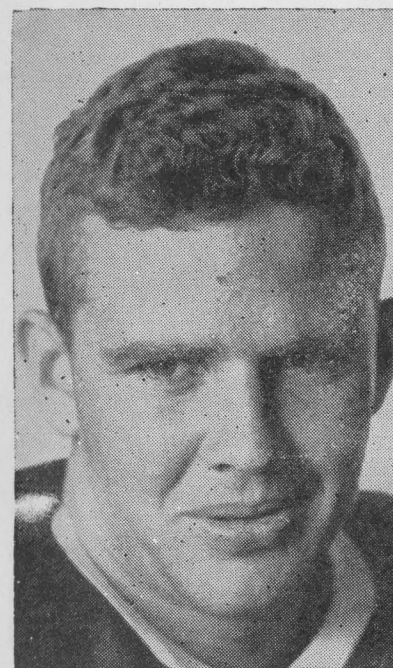
Coach Jess Neely came to Rice in 1940 and since that time the Owl football teams have had winning ways. In 10 years his teams at Rice have won 63 lost 36 and tied 4. A great many of the games lost were lost during the war years when Rice had few top notch athletes.

Neely played football at Vanderbilt in 1920, 21, and 22 under Dan McGugin and Wallace Wade. He has a law degree but has never practiced.

Neely spent nine years at Clemson before coming to Rice. There his teams won 43, lost 35 and tied 7.

Although Neely had been a long time advocae of the single wing formation he switched to the "T" in 1944. During the period after the switch to the T formation he has turned out some of the smoothest running T Formation teams in the entire southwest. His conference championship team of last was an exceptionally smooth working offensive team.

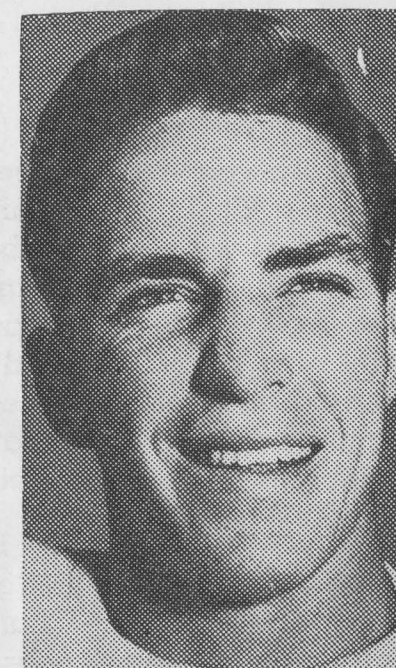

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Today's Game

What will the Owls do today? That question is on the mind of every fan here today.

The Owls started the football season furiously with victories over Santa Clara, LSU and Pittsburgh. Then they suffered defeats at the hands of the Texas Longhorns and the SMU Mustangs. Since that time the Owls have managed to eke out wins over Texas Tech and the University of Arkansas. In all fairness to the Owls it must be pointed out that they suffered numerous injuries in their games with Pitt, SMU and Texas.

This will be the first game in which the Owls, Conference Champions of 1949, will be at anywhere near full strength.

The Rice attack will be powered by the strong throwing arm of Quarterback Vernon Glass. The Owl Fullback George Glauseris currently has a yardage gained average of 5 yards per carry. Rounding out the Owl backfield is Billy Burkhalter and Sonny Wyatt.

The Rice line is big and rugged. It will be bolstered by such tackles and

guards as Charles Stearns,, 202; Fred Curry, 225; Paul Giroski, 250; Ted Watson, 210; Bob Winship, 235.

The Aggies will be at full strength for the contest today. Currently the Aggies are leading the conference in total yards gained offensively. The Aggies attack will again be built around Fullback Bob Smith and Halfbacks Glenn Lippman and Bill Tidwell. Each of these backs ranks in the top ten in yardage gained and none of these three have an average of less than 5 yards per carry.

The offensive line which has been outstanding in opening holes for the ball carrier will consist of Hugh Meyer, Carl Molberg, Max Greiner, Andy Hillhouse, Charles Hodge, Dwayne Tucker and Sam Moses.

This game might settle down to a battle between Fullbacks Smith and Glauser. Smith is leading the conference in scoring and in yardage gained.

The main question about today's game though will be whether the Aggies can stop the Rice passing attack.

1950 Foot Ball Rule Changes

The first thing that spectators will notice and will be glad of is the establishment of an imaginary line encircling the field five feet from the side and end lines. This limit line is established both to prevent non-players from obstructing spectators' view and to eliminate the possibility of injury both to players and spectators when players inadvertently run off of the playing field.

The next rule change that the spectators are most likely to notice as the game progresses is should the kicking team recover its own kick, a mandatory time out is taken by the referee in order to facilitate exchange of personnel so that the kicking team may get their offensive players in and the team which should have received the kick can change to their defensive line-up.

On the kicking subject the fair catch rule has been delete dfrom the playing code. As you remember in the past when the safety man had very little time to catch a punt before he was to be tackled, he could raise his hand above his head and be protected from tacklers. Even though the opportunity for fair catch does not exist, the kicking team still must not interfere with the opportunity of the receiving team from catching the punt until it has been touched by a member of the receiving team. The penalty for this foul is fifteen yards from the spot of the foul and possession of the ball.

Games this year may run slightly longer since

each team will be allowed five free time outs each half rather than four. However, in an effort to "pick up" extra time, the rules committee has decreed that the game clock should start when the ball is "ready for play" after free time outs rather than waiting for the ball to be snapped.

This year a substitution made while the game clock is running will cause a charged time out until the team has exhausted its five time outs rather than the five yard "delay of the game" penalty which was in order last year.

Since modern football began, the rules have read that the game should be played with eleven players, but now a team can play with less than eleven players. Naturally, they will not do this often, but the rule was changed to prevent penalty when a team inadvertently does not replace all of the players who came out of the game.

For the past several years many jaw bones, noses have been smashed and teeth loosened by illegal, but "difficult to enforce under the rules" elbow usage. This year shoulder and forearm blocking must be confined to the opponents shoulder level or below unless in the progress of the block the opponent drops in such a way as to put his head in an inadvertently dangerous position. Coaches, players and officials hope that unnecessary roughness may be eliminated by this rule change.

On a successful "try for point" a foul by the defensive team is penalized from the succeeding kick off.

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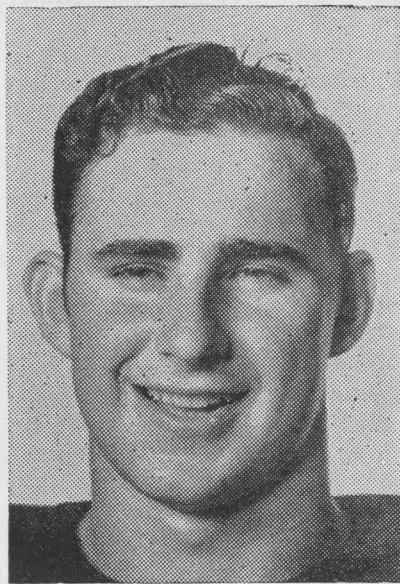
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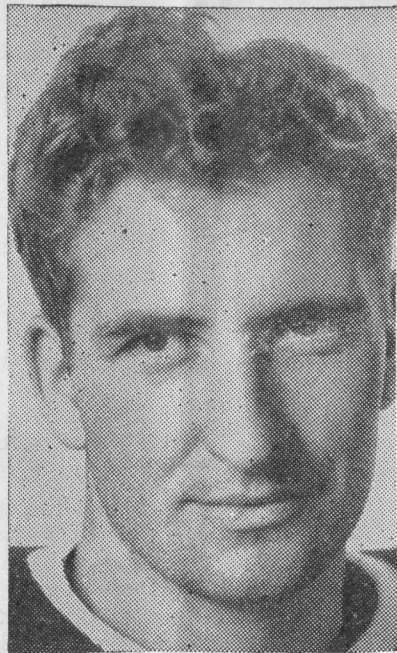


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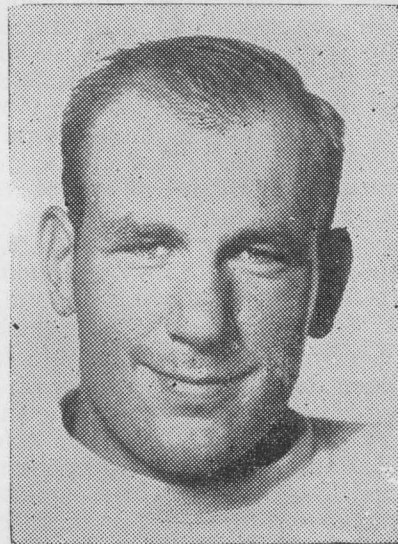

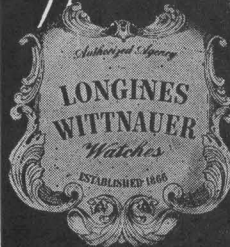
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AT HALFTIME

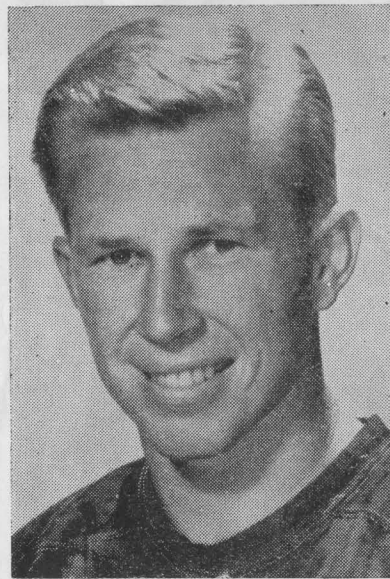
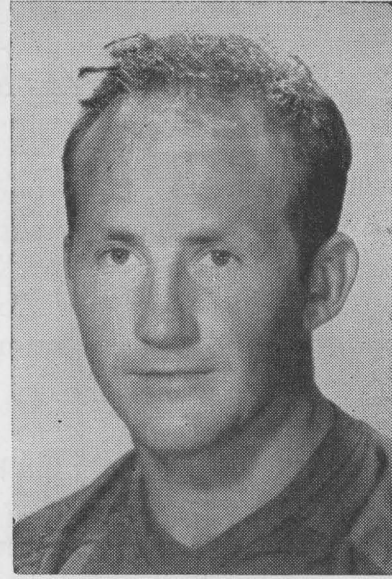
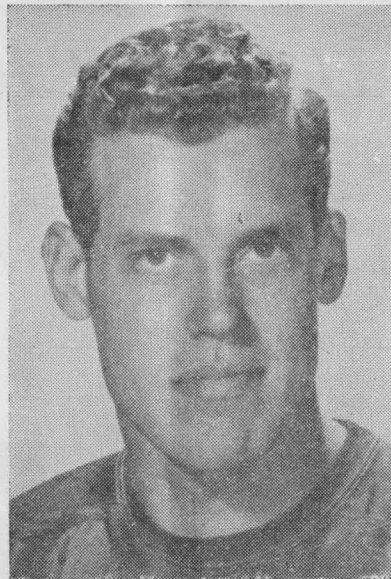
The reading on the scroll is as follows:

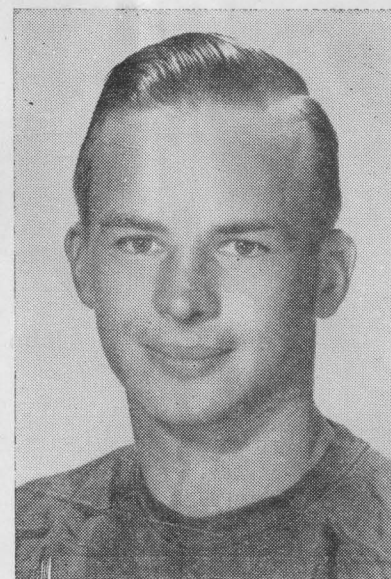
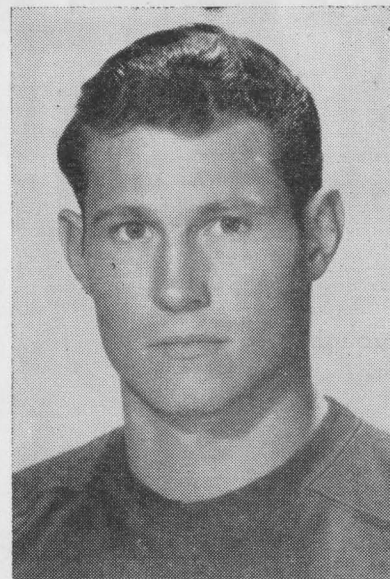
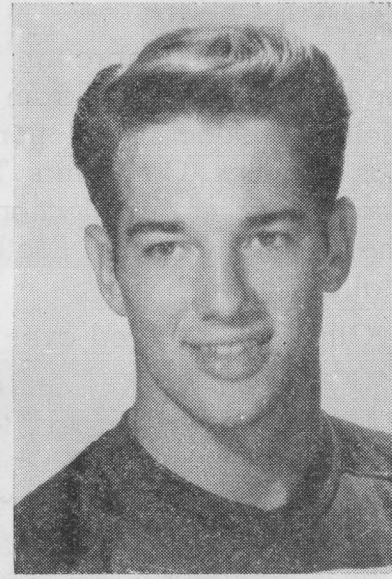
